



It is a tradition to throw bright, colourful power and water as part of the celebrations on the second day of the festival. Some people smear the power on each other's skin. The coloured powder is called gulal. Many places and people are covered in a mix of bright colours during Holi.

offerings:	Something that is given to a God as part of a religious ceremony.
shrine:	A shrine is a place where people worship because it is connected with a holy person or event.




